

Lyveden New Bield, sheep and tree saplings

WALK 1 Lyveden Way

A linear walk from the Country Park to Lyveden New Bield. The route leaves the Park and heads east along the perimeter of Fermyn Woods and Tresham Coppice. Then east across open countryside towards Lady Wood Head, follow the perimeter of the wood east towards Lyveden New Bield. Distance 8 miles – moderate terrain.

WALK 2 Woodland Walk A circular walk which begins at the Country Park. Follow the purple bands. Distance 1 mile – hard-surface,


WALK 3 Fermvn Forest Walk

Commences at the Country Park. Follow the orange bands. Distance 1¹/2 miles – combined hard-surface / soft track.

A network of public footpaths and bridleways combine with circular trails to provide access to some of the best countryside in the County.

BRIGSTOCK & FERMYN WOODS

The Northampton village of Brigstock is closely linked to Fermyn Woods Country Park which provides a gateway to an area of great historical interest and outstanding beauty.



Brigstock is situated in the north-east of the county approx. 5 miles from Thrapston.

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Brigstock lies within an area of great historical interest and natural beauty. Once the largest settlement in Rockingham Forest, it commanded an important position between the Royal Parks of Farming (Fermyn) Woods and Geddington Chase. Remnants of the woods and coppices still exist in the parish.

Although the present village only dates from Saxon times, the area has been settled since at least the early Bronze Age around 1500BC.



St. Andrew's Church - Brigstock

St. Andrew's Church

St. Andrew's is one of the earliest churches in the county, the round tower and the clock chamber with its Saxon window date from 750-800AD. One of the great mysteries of the church is the large, circular extension to the west tower which seems too big to have contained just a staircase.

The Manor House

The original manor was built in c.1150 as a Royal Hunting Lodge. Various Kings hunted the Royal Parks of Geddington and Farming (Fermyn) Woods. King John stayed at the manor several times and held court in February 1207.

Market Cross 4 In 1466 Edward IV granted Brigstock a market which was held on Hall Hill. The ancient market cross bears a series of dates connected with the Queens of England - the earliest being ER 1586.

The Water Mill

A mill was recorded in the Doomsday Book, 1085, and the present one was in use until 1910. The mill is now a private dwelling but the water wheel is still intact.

Lyveden New Bield dominates the local landscape. It was the creation of Sir Thomas Tresham, who was a devout Catholic during the reign of the protestant gueen, Elizabeth I (it was his son, Francis Tresham, who later became embroiled in the Gunpowder Plot). When Sir Thomas died in 1605, the lodge and gardens were still incomplete.

Fermyn Woods Country Park

Located next to the A6116 between Corby and Thrapston and near the limestone village of Brigstock, the Country Park is a working partnership between Northamptonshire



County Council and Forest Enterprise. Fermyn Woods forms part of the ancient woodlands of Rockingham Forest. The area is steeped in history and rich in wildlife with a landscape that may have changed little over the past two thousand years.
